Have you met James?

■he Lectionary readings have been taking us through the book of James this season. Pastors tend to favor the Gospel Lesson when writing a sermon - but James has caught the attention of both preacher and congregation alike.

James is a short letter tucked between Hebrews and First Peter in the New Testament. "James" has traditionally been identified as James the brother of Jesus (Gal 1.19), who became the leader of the church in Jerusalem and who was martyred before the outbreak of the Jewish war of 66-70 CE. The memory of James was widely revered in the early church and the name may have been used to preserve his legacy.

The book of James is not an historical narrative detailing the acts of specific people, but a classical letter of advice to Christians and early churches. The work is considered New Testament wisdom literature because, like Proverbs it consists largely of moral exhortations and precepts.

James is loaded with statements, slogans, and imperatives to live by the rules' it accents the need to internalize the teachings, offering

instructive insights for believers living the Christian faith. This letter is a clear statement to believers about personal religious integrity, spiritual maturity, unselfishness in relations, and how to live responsibly in the church and the world.

Be sure to look up and review these key verses in James:

James 1:2-8	Whenever you face trial
James 1:12-13	Blessed is anyone who endures temptation
James 2:1-13	Acts of favoritism
James 2:14-26	If you have faith but d not have works?
James 4:1-17	Conflicts and disputes among you
James 5:13-20	Are any among you suffering?

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ, Peace Memorial Family:

I would like to share an excerpt from a blog post written by J. Barrett Lee, pastor of First Presbyterian Church in Boonville, NY. He shares,

"Whenever a congregation goes looking for a new pastor, the first question on their minds when the committee interviews a new candidate is: Will this pastor grow our church? I'm going to go ahead and answer that question right now: No, she will not."

It was these opening sentences that caught my attention. Is he writing specifically about our church? I kept on reading and suggest you do too. "No amount of pastoral eloquence, organization, insightfulness, amicability, or charisma will take your congregation back to its glory days. What can [a new pastor] do to grow your church? Nothing. There's nothing your pastor can do to make your church grow. She can't save your church. Your church already has a Savior and it's not her.

She can push you. She can open doors. She can present you with opportunities. It's up to you to take advantage of them. She can plant seeds and water them. It's up to God to make them grow. And what if that happens? What will growth look like? Will all those old, inactive members suddenly return? Will the pews be packed again? Will you need to start a second service and buy the lot next door in order to expand the parking lot? No. You might see a few new faces in the crowd. There won't be many of them. Some might stick around but some won't. Those who stay won't fit in with the old guard. They won't know about how you've always done it. They'll want to make changes of their own. Their new ideas will make you uncomfortable. Your church won't look or feel like it used to. You'll feel like you're losing control of this place that you've worked so hard to preserve."

I'm not sure what to tell you about these growing pains. As of October 1st I will have been at Peace Memorial for a year. Within that year we've experienced a lot of transition - but we've managed to hold it all together remarkably well. I feel like we are primed for a transformation. I feel like we are on the verge of something great - but what great is isn't the glory days relived. It can't be. There is something new on the horizon.

The community that surrounds Peace Memorial has changed. Downtown Clearwater has changed. It's up to us to trust that God will provide a way for us to continue to do God's work in the world as the church. Continue to hold the work of the Designated Pastor Nominating Committee in prayer. We pray specifically for the guidance of the Holy Spirit in their discernment process and interactions with potential candidates. Continue to pray for the church and for you to find where you can be part of the future of Peace Memorial.

REFORMATION SUNDAY

he last Sunday in October (October **28th**) is recognized as Reformation Sunday, On this Sunday, Christians remember the Reformation, revisit its great truths and recommit to its guiding principles.

The Reformation was a period in history (generally 1500 to 1600) when Christians in many churches in Europe sought to return to the essential and critical biblical truths of the Christian faith. Out of this movement came the existence and growth of the Protestant churches in the Christian family, such as Lutherans, Presbyterians and Baptists.

Early reformers included Martin Luther, John Calvin, Ulrich Zwingli, Heinrich Bullinger and John Knox. While Luther was the catalyst that exploded the movement, Calvin was its chief theologian, systematizing the biblical truths

rediscovered from the scriptures. John Knox, a Scotsman who studied with Calvin in Geneva, took Calvin's teachings back to Scotland, where we trace the origins of the Presbyterian Church.

Key aspects of reformed theology include the authority of scripture and the doctrines of grace. These focus on the sovereignty of God's grace, especially in salvation. Our relationship with God and our freedom from sin and death don't come from our works or specific acts. We cannot earn God's love: it is a gift called grace.

In gratitude for the gift of God's love, we seek to live as God desires us to live. Reformation Sunday refocuses Protestants to look to the Bible, Jesus Christ and faith in God alone as the best and most trustworthy guide for our living.

We gather to listen anew to Christ's call in our lives and to thankfully offer ourselves in response to hearing God's Word.

In the spirit of the Clearwater Jazz Festival (www.clearwaterjazz.com) we celebrate worship with our own 'Jazz style'. Jazz Directions Combo will join us in leading music for this special service. The director is Jim Burge.

The legendary trumpeter Miles Davis once said, "When you hit a wrong note, it's the next note you hit that makes it good or bad." This serves as a fine metaphor for the grace-infused Christian life. And it reminds us that, despite its past, jazz has a potentially bright future within the church, blessing God and God's people.

Bill Carter, a Presbyterian preacher from Pennsylvania, is perhaps the leading figure exploring the use of jazz in worship. Carter has put together a small hymnal of over sixty musical settings of psalms, hymns, and spiritual song.

Choir rehearses most Sundays, after worship, at 11:45 am. See Carol Alexander for more information.



PACK-A-SACK 4 KIDS

ack-A-Sack 4 Kids is a community outreach program of local school boards in Pinellas, Manatee, and Pasco Counties, and area churches and collaborative partners. The program is designed to help address the problem of chronic hunger among elementary age children in our public schools. This has been estimated to be approximately 10-15% of all children eligible for free or reduced meals at school.

Peace Memorial has partnered with Ponce de Leon Elementary School to provide over 40 food sacks for hungry children in our community. Eligible children are identified by a teacher or school personnel because that child exhibits behaviors that may indicate

Food insecurity is describe as limited or uncertain access to a nutritionally adequate diet, characterized by skipped meals, reduced food portions and/or uncertainty of being able to adequately feed all household members.

Peace Memorial is helping to sponsor this important event for Clothes To Kids (www. ClothesToKids.org), a nonprofit located in Clearwater and St. Petersburg. Their mission is to provide new and quality used clothing to lowincome, school-age children in Pinellas County, free of charge.

This event is designed to collect underwear and "underwrite" underwear - a basic part of the CTK wardrobe. Underwear cannot be used. It must be in an unopened package - Sizes: Girls and Boys (Sizes 4-16), Junior Girls (Sizes 0-22Y) and Young Men (Sizes 18 -44). The collection ends with a celebration at the store on October 25 from 4-6 p.m.

RCS FOOD BANK

RCS Food Bank Volunteers from RCS come to our church each week to pick up our food donations. Sometimes they leave empty handed! Renew your commitment to help those who are hungry in our community.

RCS accepts any unopened food. Nonperishable items are best. Turn your weekly grocery shopping trip into a spiritual practice. Try to get in the habit of picking up extra food to donate each time you go to grocery store. Be on the look out for deals and sales that can help feed those who are hungry in our community.

We are committed to helping the vulnerable and the stranger in need by showing compassion as Jesus commands us to serve the 'least of these'.

Freeman Teuton receives Harold Updike Servant of the Year Award on June 17th.

The name of Freeman Teuton, a member of Peace Memorial for over 30 years, has been added to the Plaque which hangs permanently in Peace Café. This award is named for Harold Updike, a founding member of the Men's Group who was an active participant in Peace Café until shortly before his death. This award is intended to recognize and honor an individual who has provided significant service to the vibrant and growing Men's Ministry at Peace Memorial.

Freeman is just such a person. He has served Peace Memorial in just about every capacity, including chairing the Personnel Council and service on the Finance Council. For many years, Freeman was an active supporter of the Cold Night Shelter and continues to be part of the Early Morning

Bible Study and Sunday School Groups. More recently he has been an important part of Peace Café where he is known as a bread slicer par excellence.

He has been married to his wonderful wife Ann for 68 years and they have a daughter, a son-in-law, and two grandchildren. He was educated as a lawyer and had a successful career in the Transportation Industry. He is a veteran having served as a Naval Officer both in WWII and later in Korea when he was recalled to active duty. He was cited for "Gallantry in action and meritorious dedication to duty."

Freeman Teuton's dedication to Peace Memorial is is self-evident to all who know him. We are thankful to have this opportunity to honor him and recognize his service to our church.
